Ravenscar is minor roads N of A171 SE of Whitby.

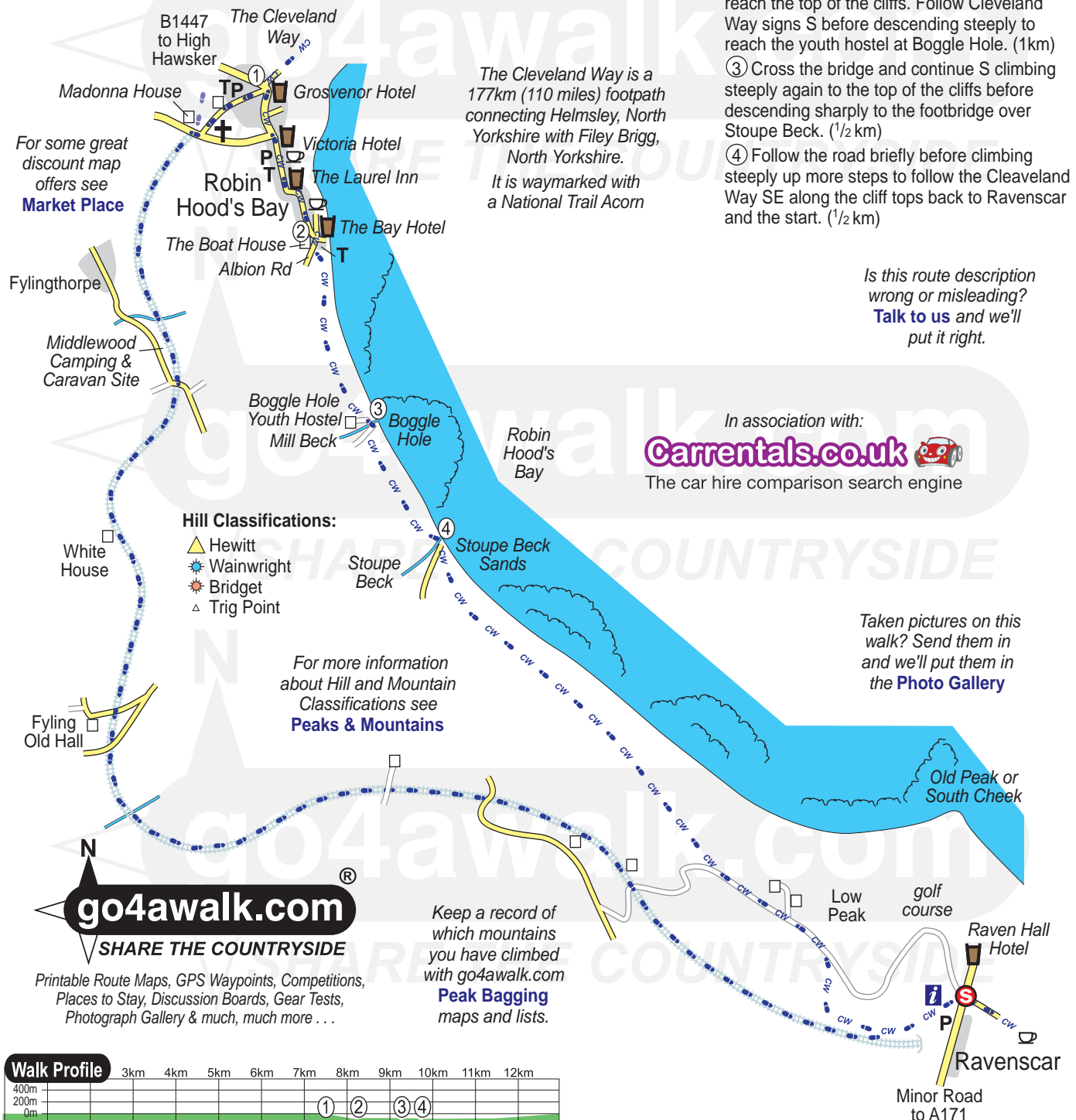

Superb coastal views

S Go SW from the entrance to The Raven Hotel ('Peakside' sign) to pass the National Trust Coastal Information Centre. At a fork, leave the Cleveland Way (which descends in-front of you) and bear SW (half-left) to join a dismantled railway line. Follow the track bed W, N and finally NE to reach Thorpe Lane. Go right on the road for 30m before forking half-left following signs for 'Village Hall' & 'Station Workshops' to reach a large car park. (7½ km)

- ① Beyond the car park go S (right) on the main road (joining the Cleveland Way) and descend towards the village. Continue S past a 2nd car park to descend steeply down a narrow street to reach the beach. (¾ km)
- ② Retrace your steps 20m past the public toilets before going S (left) on Albion Road ('Cleveland Way' sign). At Flagstaff Cottage fork SE (half-left) up steep steps and then S (right) at a junction on a wooden walkway to reach the top of the cliffs. Follow Cleveland Way signs S before descending steeply to reach the youth hostel at Boggle Hole. (1km)
- ③ Cross the bridge and continue S climbing steeply again to the top of the cliffs before descending sharply to the footbridge over Stoupe Beck. (½ km)
- ④ Follow the road briefly before climbing steeply up more steps to follow the Cleveland Way SE along the cliff tops back to Ravenscar and the start. (½ km)



The Cleveland Way is a 177km (110 miles) footpath connecting Helmsley, North Yorkshire with Filey Brigg, North Yorkshire.

It is waymarked with a National Trail Acorn
